I am planting better boy tomatoes. They do well in CT, are highly disease resistant and are very good to can. I have grown these for many years and highly recommend them. They lose their color on their top shoulder if they get too much sun.

I am trying a white to light yellow paste tomato named Cream Sausage Tomato from Rareseeds.com. I will let ya know how my white spaghetti sauce tastes.

This year I am again planting Long Tall Sally hybrid Italian Fry Peppers. These are available exclusively from Burpee Seed Company. They do well in CT, with little care, except that they need to be staked. Watch for hornworms on their leaves. These are harvested when 6 to 8 inches long. Wash, blanch and freeze the strips. They are great in stews, soups, spaghetti sauce and even sprinkled on frozen pizza prior to cooking.

- Don't forget to harden off your indoor grown seedlings before planting outside
- We are in USDA hardness zone 7A
